## Arts, Entertainment and Recreation (NAICS 71)

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) keeps records not only of the most frequently cited standards overall, but also within particular industries. The most recent statistics from OSHA reveal the top standards cited in the fiscal year 2016 for the arts, entertainment and recreation industry. This top 10 list comprises establishments that operate facilities or provide services to meet varied cultural, entertainment and recreational interests of their patrons. This sector comprises establishments that are involved in producing or promoting live performances, events or exhibits intended for public viewing, establishments that preserve and exhibit objects and sites of historical, cultural or educational interest and establishments that operate facilities or provide services that enable patrons to participate in recreational activities or pursue amusement, hobby and leisure-time interests.
